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Leadership today

- Tips, tricks and methods without much theology
- Easy to build our own systems and ideals
 - autonomous no higher authority
 - pragmatic default to what works
 - moral my way is the right way

Leadership eternal

- Leadership begins with God
- Leadership is about God's glory
- Leadership is for God's mission
- · Leadership is defined by God's word

Old Testament offices established to lead Israel

- Prophet God's messenger to the people
 - Condemnation / Exile
 - Hope / Restoration
- Priest Mediator for the people
 - Offer sacrifices on their behalf
- King Rule over God's people
 - Provide structure and leadership

The Bible is all about Jesus (Luke 4:16-21)

- One true God eternally existing in three persons: Father, Son, Holy Spirit
- Man is created in God's image and likeness (Genesis 1,2)
- Mankind is fallen and sinful (Genesis 3, Romans 3:23)
- Father sends the Son Jesus to rescue sinners (Romans 3:24-25)
- Father and Son send the Holy Spirit (John 14:15-31)
- Jesus establishes his church (Acts)
- Jesus will return, defeating satan, sin and death for good, establishing the new heaven and the new earth (Revelation 20-22)

All three Old Testament offices foreshadow Jesus

- Jesus is the Final Prophet
 - Earthly ministry Preaching "repent and believe the gospel" (Mark 1:15)
- Jesus is the Great High Priest
 - Earthly ministry Healing the sick and oppressed (Mark 1:34)
- Jesus is the Conquering King
 - Earthly ministry Calling, leading, and building a team of disciples (Mark 1:17)

In our sinful state we're helpless; Jesus is the exclusive answer for sin

- We are ignorant foolish in our understanding (Romans 1:21,25)

 As **Prophet** Jesus reveals truth in Word & Person, illuminates our ignorance (John 1:4-5, 14:9)
- We are guilty born into sin and committing sin (Genesis 6:5)

 As **Priest** Jesus becomes our only, sufficient, mediating sacrifice, redemption for our guilt (Hebrews 4:14-15)
- Corrupt contaminated and polluted by sin (Ephesians 4:17,18)

 As **King** Jesus rules over creation and the Church, hope for our corruption (John 1:3, Ephesians 4:15-16)

Jesus is Senior Pastor of the Church

- As Prophet His Word is in authority (2 Timothy 3:16)
- As Priest He is the Chief Shepherd (1 Peter 5:4)
- As King He is the Head of the Body (Ephesians 4:15)

Jesus has given the Church a mission

- Be my witnesses (Acts 1:8)
- Go and make disciples (Matthew 28:19)
- Preach the gospel, plant churches & establish leaders (Acts; Titus 1:5)

Jesus appoints leaders in the Church to lead the mission

- Elders Pastors, Shepherds, Teachers, Apostles, Evangelists, Rulers (Acts 20; Ephesians 4; 1 Timothy 3)
- Deacons Servants, Assistants, Under Shepherds (Acts 6; 1 Timothy 3)
- Members The Body, care for each other, doing ministry (Ephesians 4)

Leaders image Jesus to the Church and to the world—together and imperfectly

- Prophet The people must be taught the Bible
- Priest The people must be loved
- King The people must be led

Leadership teams need to be humble and unified

- Around Jesus and the mission
- Under the authority of his Word
- In philosophical agreement around particular vision and strategy
- Working together in relational unity

Leadership teams need to be humble and diverse

- Having different spiritual gifts (Romans 12)
- Balanced with Prophet, Priest, King
- Recognizing and valuing various leadership styles

Leadership teams need to reflect the Trinity

- Father, Son, Holy Spirit unified and diverse
- Equality amongst team (an elder is an elder)
- Authority and submission amongst team (firsts among equals)

"All three persons participate in all the works of God: creation, revelation, redemption, judgment. The three glorify one another (John 7:18; 8:50; 16:14; cf. Ps. 110:1). There are some differences in focus. In redemption, the Father foreknows, the Son sprinkles blood, the Spirit sanctifies (1 Peter 1:2). To generalize, the Father foreordains, the Son accomplishes, and the Spirit applies the work of Christ to the heart. The Father plans, the Son executes, the Spirit applies. Perhaps this is the intra-Trinitarian basis for the three lordship attributes. The Father is the authority, the Son is the controller, the Spirit the presence. Remember that even as the Father is planning, the Son and the Spirit are joyfully cooperating, and the same is true for all the divine tasks."



SMI	CHARACTERISTICS Values practical application; likes facts and figures. STRENGTHS Vision-casting; communicating strategy. WEAKNESSES May incline listeners to behavior modification rather than gospel change.	CHARACTERISTICS Values results, goals; flock-focused. STRENGTHS Organizing, managing, coaching other priests; demonstrating how the gospel is lived out in practice. WEAKNESSES May be overly prescriptive.	CHARACTERISTICS Practical; not satisfied with theorizing. STRENGTHS Implementation, organization, management, coaching; creating and leading structure; developing actionable steps. WEAKNESSES Accomplishing goals without caring for people; typically weak on theology of structure and vision-casting.
PRIMARY DRIMARY	CHARACTERISTICS Goal in preaching is heartfelt worship over intellectual stimulation or practical application. STRENGTHS Ability to move emotions and affections through preaching, leading congregation to passionate worship. WEAKNESSES May pursue emotional response to the detriment of sound doctrine.	CHARACTERISTICS More likely to listen rather than speak; sheep-focused. STRENGTHS Providing help for those who have been "truthed" to death or burnt out or misunderstood by prophets and kings. WEAKNESSES Difficulty developing systems and vision-casting.	CHARACTERISTICS Won't find creation of structure enjoyable unless it is connected to caring for people. STRENGTHS Shepherding people through change; connecting structures to the gospel. WEAKNESSES May pull the E-brake too soon or too often.
PROPHET	CHARACTERISTICS Values precision, clarity, truth above practical application or emotional response. Tendency to intellectualize the gospel. STRENGTHS Effective communicator of biblical truth and guard against subjectivism. WEAKNESSES May neglect the heart and pastoral care in favor of truth proclamation.	CHARACTERISTICS More likely to speak rather than to listen. STRENGTHS Providing help for those who haven't been given much truth; effective gospel communication in counseling situations. WEAKNESSES May lack follow-through	CHARACTERISTICS Initiate a project then move on; not content with structure unless it is connected to greater value or truth. STRENGTHS Launching initiatives/change; connecting structures to theological truths. WEAKNESSES Management, implementation, details; tendency to forget feelings of others during change.

10 Takeaways

- 1. Leaders need to be good in and under authority, modeling Trinitarian equality and submission.
- 2. Everyone gains and gives up something to be a part of a great team.
- 3. Understand the difference between a movement-focused, flock-focused and sheep-focused leader.
- 4. Find your identity in Jesus and not your leadership style.
- 5. Avoid pigeon-holing leaders but do recognize their strengths and weaknesses to slot them accordingly.
- 6. Build your communication strategy around speaking all three languages to the church: Prophet, Priest and King (scripture, stories, stats).
- 7. Think one to three stages ahead of where you are at and anticipate what leaders you'll need for each stage.
- 8. Providing jobs for people is not the primary mission of the church; gracefully make the hard calls when necessary.
- 9. Different seasons call for different leadership gifts on your team or in the organization. Ensure flexible structures that allow for ebb and flow.
- 10. Honor Jesus' authority in your church as the Final Prophet, the Great High Priest, and the Conquering King!
